- 4. Why do you think that the Wife of Bath digresses from her original story in lines 102-119?
- 5. Of the answers suggested to the Knight's question, which does the Wife of Bath think is the best?
- 6. What criticism of women does the Wife of Bath offer in lines 120-126?
- 7. What is the rhetorical purpose of the Wife of Bath's story about Midas?
- 8. Why is it ironic that this should be the answer that saves the knight's life in lines 213-221?
- 9. What does the woman request as her reward for helping the knight?
- 10. What is your reaction to the knight's reluctance to grant her request? Do you think he deserves what he is getting or is he being unduly punished?
- 11. Is the knight's reaction to the old woman an example of direct or indirect characterization? What does it reveal about his character? What value system does the old woman reject and what values does she affirm in the long speech in lines 282-314?
- 12. What are the "temporal things such as may hurt and maim?"
- 13. What philosophical point is the old woman making by contrasting men and fire?
- 14. What arguments does the old woman present in favor of poverty?
- 15. What do you think of the choice the old woman is offering the knight in the lines of 396-403?
